Tuesday 14th January

GOOD BEER GUIDE SELECTION MEETING

7pm for 7.30pm prompt start, at the <u>Crown & Anchor</u>, 19 Park Rd, Bromley BR1 3H.

Yes it's that time of year again when we vote for those pubs which should be included in the 2021 (yes 2021!) guide. As usual the meeting will be held in the **Crown and Anchor**, which offers us the privacy we need. The pub is located a short walk away from Bromley North Station / bus terminal and the Market Square.

All members of Bromley CAMRA are encouraged to attend and vote, but in order to vote you will need to show your current membership card. Please send any inquiries about this evening to gbg@bromley.camra.org.uk

Monday 20th January. Afternoon Social in Green St Green.

- 1. Buff
- 2. Queen's Head

Starting 2pm at **The Buff**, Pinewood Drive BR6 9N. This Greene King pub has recently been improved, and also now offers an increased range of real ales with a newly-introduced discount for CAMRA members. We felt it deserved a CAMRA social to encourage their efforts! Several bus routes pass near to this pub. From Central Bromley or Beckenham use the 358, or alternatively the local R4, R5, R8 and R11 routes. Alight at Crescent Road.

From there we have a short walk to arrive at 3.30pm at the **Queen's Head**, 73 High St. BR6 6BQ. For those joining the social here, the pub can be reached on the high frequency 358 bus route from Crystal Palace to Orpington via Beckenham and Bromley. Alight at Farnborough Hill/Bus Garage from where a 15 minute walk is needed. Or to get closer use the local and less frequent R1, R5 or R11 routes from Orpington bus station and alight at High Street/Green Street Green. The pub has a cask club day on Mondays, with all cask beers priced at £2.99/pint.

Saturday 25th January. Dartford & Crayford Social.

From Central Bromley, the quickest way to Dartford is to get the 269 bus as far as Sidcup Station and then take the train to Dartford station from where a short walk is needed. Begin by crossing the footbridge over the

main road that you will see when leaving the railway station, and then walk past the ALDI (ie with the store on your right) and then follow signs to the bus station. The first pub, The Dartford Jug, is visible from the eastern end of the bus station. Trains leave Sidcup at 11.48, 11.58 and 12.18 (and in each case half-hourly thereafter). Some members will be catching the 11.48.

The social starts at 12.30pm at The **Dartford Jug**, 8 Market St. DA1 1ET. (For information - The pub opens at 12 noon). This new and excellent micropub which opened in September 2018, offers a selection of beers sourced from around the country (ie not just Kent and London).

Our next stop is **Dartford Working Men's Club**, Essex Rd DA1 2AU - is about 10 minutes walk from the Dartford Jug, and is a similar distance from the station. If you like a huge and an ever-changing variety of real ales (served from 15 handpumps) from breweries large and small (but mainly small) from all over the country all priced (as at Oct 2019) at £2.90/pint, then this is the place for you. Please bring your CAMRA card though. The Club has previously been CAMRA's National Club of the Year, and is a frequent finalist.

We aim to get to our final venue of the day, The **Penny Farthing**, 3 Waterside, Crayford DA1 4JJ, by 4pm. This fine micropub has been Bexley CAMRA Pub of the Year for three years in a row up to 2017. From the DWMC, a train journey of one stop is needed to Crayford, with a short walk from there. When it's time to go home, there is a train service to Sidcup from where the reasonably frequent 269 bus runs to Bromley North via Chislehurst and Bickley, and the 51 bus runs to Orpington.

Tuesday 25th January. Committee meeting.

7.30pm. **Imperial Arms**, Old Hill, Chislehurst BR7 5LZ. Bromley CAMRA members who are not on the committee are always welcome to attend committee meetings. Non-committee members planning to attend a meeting may request the Secretary (<u>secretary@bromley.camra.org.uk</u>) to prepare and print a pack of relevant committee papers to be made available at the meeting.

The "Impi" is an attractively situated pub, less than 10 minutes walk from Chislehurst Station but the walk being sharply uphill. The walk can be avoided by catching the 162 (Beckenham Junction to Eltham), 269 (Bromley North to Bexleyheath) or R7 (Five Bells to Chislehurst) bus. In all cases alight at Susan Wood. The first two routes mentioned can be caught in Central Bromley

Thursday 6th February. Social at **South Norwood Beer Festival.**

From 12 noon. The Stanley Halls, 12 South Norwood Hill, London SE25 6AB; This beer festival is run by our neighbouring Croydon & Sutton branch, and will have a good range of ales, cider and perry available.

The hall is easily reached by bus from Penge High Street. Take the 75 bus heading towards Croydon Town Centre, alight at Portland Road. Carry walking forward toward the traffic lights (junction High Street/ South Norwood Hill - Portland Road). At the lights, turn right into South Norwood Hill. The hall is a short distance up the road on the right hand side.

An opportunity to visit Bromley CAMRA's Club of the year 2019 to try a range of beers from the Loddingstone (near Maidstone) based Musket brewery, as well as meet and have a chat with the brewers. The club is located opposite Tesco near the Orpington War Memorial, and is a short walk downhill from Orpington Station. The club is also well served by buses from Bromley, including the 61, 208 and 358 - alight at Orpington War Memorial. Many other local buses stop nearby. The club welcomes card carrying CAMRA members (please do remember to bring your membership card along).

Orpington Liberal Club has also been awarded London CAMRA Regional Club of the Year 2019, and is one of the four clubs going forward to be judged for the CAMRA National Club of the Year.

Best Bottled Beer

On 2 December, CAMRA named the best bottled beer in Britain. Made by Thornbridge, the Saint Petersburg imperial Russian Stout won the crown as a rich and full-bodied stout with black treacle and dark notes. It has a robust, bitter finish that gives it a great balance. Why not try some?

Looking at CAMRA policies, there has been a recent publication of the new CAMRA Policy Document for consultation with members. The Tale of a London Porter

In November's newsletter I told the story of how I brewed an English Pale Ale using the hops of a Bromley CAMRA member. In this month's home brewing slot I will be turning from the 'Light Side' to the 'Dark Side' and go to the opposite end of the beer spectrum. I will be writing about brewing a London Porter. The London Porter I am making is a clone of the very famous Fuller's London Porter. This is a rich and flavoursome dark ale based on an 1880's Fuller's recipe. The only hop used is Fuggles, which gives a delicate, minty, grassy and slightly floral aroma to the beer. The flavour has hints of roast coffee and chocolate, with a complex finish and liquorish maltiness. The recipe I have used is one from Graham Wheeler's book called "Brew Your Own British Real Ale", 3rd Edition, and was published by CAMRA in 2009. Graham was an early pioneer of home brewing and inspired so many to brew their own quality beer in defiance of commercial blandness. Although out of print, his books are well worth

tracking down. Sadly, he left this world to become 'Supreme Beer Cicerone' in November 2017.



One of the joys of brewing your own beer is the pleasure of designing your own beer labels and pub clips. Here's the label I designed for this brew. How many of the London sights can you recognise in the picture?

I was so happy with the way this beer turned out that I entered it into a national beer completion. This was the Brew Con World Series III held in East London in November 2019. There were over 450 entries and I am pleased to say that my beer came second in the "UK Brown Beers" class. Have a look at this link to find out more about the recipe and how it was brewed.

Beer Scores News

Thank you to all those members of the branch who submitted Beer Scores during 2019. Beer Scoring for 2019 closed on Christmas Eve, and since then the Beer Score Coordinator has been doing the necessary number-crunching to produce the 'long-list' of pubs/clubs that we will be considering for possible inclusion in the next Good Beer Guide. The full report will be presented to the GBG Selection meeting on 14th January.

The Beer Scores results will remain confidential until that meeting, but we can report the following:

- 4,743 valid scores were submitted
- 165 members submitted scores
- At least one score was received for every pub and eligible club in our area

In the next newsletter we hope to be able to give some further data from the 2019 Beer Scores. Beer Scoring is now open for 2020. If you don't normally do Beer Scoring, why not make it a resolution to do so in 2020? More information about Beer Scoring is available on the branch website.

BR6 Area News

Some encouraging news from Orpington & Farnborough. The new management took over at the <u>Cricketers</u>, early in December. In the run up to Christmas they were running 2 cask ale pumps and plan for a third, when the turnover increases. Regular beers will include Harvey's Sussex and some familiar brews from around Kent. A bit more exciting than the 6X or Bombardier, that we had become used to. Refurbishment of the interior, has been put on hold, until Spring.

The long awaited reopening of the <u>Change of Horses</u> finally took place on Election night, under new management. Some subtle improvements have been made inside and the beer range is to be extended. Beers on offer currently are Harvey's Sussex, Tonbridge Traditional and Doom bar. The kitchen is planned to reopen at the end of the month, when they will also be announcing their regular opening times.

Update on Beckenham Beer Festival 2020

The festival team is in the early stages of planning, and the festival is booked for **23-25th July 2020**, plus setting up and taking down days. A meeting was held between the new 2020 Festival Coordinator and last year's Coordinator on the 20th December. All necessary paperwork and procedures were handed over. A Bar Manager and Cooling Manager have been identified. Many more volunteers are needed and no expertise is required – just a genuine desire to see a successful beer and cider festival and to be part of a team.

Inevitably, the long Christmas Holiday break makes progress difficult this time of year, but it is hoped to get the first meeting of a beer festival steering group off the ground in late January/early February. Volunteers are urgently needed for this, so please step forward if you think you can contribute. Two key posts we need to fill quickly are a Volunteer

Coordinator and a Health & Safety Advisor, so please get in touch if you can personally help in this area, or can suggest someone who may have the right skills.
