# Once the Pubs and Clubs Are Open

Bromley CAMRA is aiming to keep the <u>Covid-19 page on the website</u> as up to date as possible once the pubs and clubs do start to reopen, and our team of Area Reps will each be keeping an eye on what is going on in their area.

However, in what will inevitably be a fast-changing situation, it is probable that we won't be able to capture the information for every pub, especially for those pubs which do not currently use social media. Members are therefore requested to pass on whatever information you can about your local pubs(s). Please email us at news@bromley.camra.org.uk

Throughout lockdown, Bromley CAMRA's <u>Facebook</u> and <u>Twitter</u> have been sharing or retweeting any information that we received from those pubs and clubs who used social media. We will be continuing to do this once the pubs start welcoming customers back to enjoy their drinks <u>at</u> the pub, rather than just as something to take home in a plastic bottle or growler.

As yet we are not able to confirm when the branch social calendar will be resuming. The branch Committee will be discussing this at the next 'virtual' meeting of the Committee. Whilst the branch wants to do everything we can to support our pubs and clubs at this difficult time, it is possible that we may need to wait for a while, to see what the 'new normal' looks like, and to give the pubs/clubs and their regular clientele time to get reacquainted, before potentially large socially-distanced groups of us descend upon them.

# A message from CAMRA's Chief Executive

Tom Stainer, Chief Executive CAMRA made the following statement following the Government announcement on 23 June:

"Getting down to the pub for a pint with friends and family has been one of the things people have missed the most during lockdown, so it is fantastic news that people in England can start returning to their locals from 4 July.

"Understandably, this comes with a responsibility to do so safely and responsibly in line with the government's guidance. CAMRA is urging all pub-goers to follow the rules so that they can keep themselves, other pub-goers, and bar staff safe.

"On recording customer details to help testing and tracing, this seems to be above and beyond what is being asked of other types of businesses. The Government need to make sure that this doesn't disadvantage pubs and that the privacy of pub-goers is properly protected.

"Not being able to go to our local has made us realise just how important pubs are to communities, and in tackling loneliness and social isolation. That is why we need a second wave of financial support to ensure that all pubs - both those operating at reduced trade and those that cannot open safely under social distancing - can survive the next few weeks and thrive in the weeks and months ahead."



# **CAMRA Launches New Campaigns**

As pubs across the UK prepare to reopen, CAMRA is launching two new campaigns, 'Cheers to Choice' and 'Save Pubs, Join CAMRA'.

**Cheers to Choice** is a campaign to try to make sure there is a good choice of beers and ciders from local and independent producers on offer, by asking the Pubcos and multinational drinks companies to allow publicans to stock locally brewed products when they reopen.

- As pubs prepare to reopen, they are going to face many challenges to get customers back through their doors.
- One thing likely to help entice people back to their local is a good choice of beers and cider from local and independent brewers and producers.
- But publicans who are tied tenants are restricted in what they can sell, and are often prevented from putting products behind the bar that they know their customers want to drink.



## **CAMRA News**

The Branch Secretary runs through some of the national and regional news from CAMRA.

Whilst hopefully, when you read this summary, it will be only a matter of days before we can once again enjoy a pub pint on the premises (and let's hope good weather permits), the Covid virus has kept matters a little quiet on the social side. Nevertheless CAMRA continues to keep us advised through mail outs and press releases and I am pleased to summarise some of those issued since the June issue of the newsletter.

And, on the subject of pubs re-opening, a survey of 22,000 pub goers and beer drinkers across the UK has found that two thirds of people are confident to get back down the pub when their local reopens. Last month we covered the recent release of **Brew2You**. CAMRA is pleased to announce that beer lovers have been beating the lockdown blues by ordering £50,000 worth of beer, ciders and perries through this popular beer delivery app launched by CAMRA. Have you tried this app yet?

The **Red (On)Lion** (<a href="https://theredonlion.co.uk/bar">https://theredonlion.co.uk/bar</a>) continues to spread the word through its webinars and other events. Have you visited yet? Some of the events covered in June included:

- 9th June; Beer expert and author Des De Moor led a tasting of the beer style Mild, talking about the Mild style's fascinating history, the myths and some contemporary examples.
- 23rd June; The brewer and co-founder of Small Beer Brew Co, Felix James lead an on line tour
  of their Bermondsey brewery including a tasting of their four vegan low ABV brews.

30th June; The Head Brewer, David Rogerson of Wooha Brewing Co led a tasting of the brewery's core beer styles. WooHa is based in the Scottish Highlands and their beers are brewed from the same cool, clear water that go into some of Scotland's most famous whiskies!

So far, two further events have been planned for July:

- Tue 7th July; Ciderniks, makers of vegetarian- and vegan-friendly ciders
- Tue 14th July; Meet the Crumber, Crumbs Brewing brew all their beers using left over bread from their local bakery

These events limited to 50 participants in number, on a first come first serve basis, so get in there quick!

Some good news regarding **Beer Festivals**. Did you know that recent research from Northumbria University demonstrates what a positive impact beer festivals have on the local economy? It seems just one beer festival can inject substantial cash into the local economy, both directly and indirectly, with little or no cost to the local council. The report goes on to advise festivals help boost income for local hospitality and tourism businesses.

Now, given that CAMRA normally runs over 200 beer festivals across the country, we can extrapolate these findings to suggest beer festivals contribute many millions into local economies, as well as providing a valuable route to market for numerous independent breweries.

This is great news all round – for local councils, local pubs and consumer choice. So, here's looking forward to a return to near normality and our enjoyment of a beer festival or two in the near future

#### Are You a Cider drinker?

CAMRA has published two new pieces of cider–focused content as part of its new Learn & Discover offering: a video guide on how to taste cider by cider writer James Finch, and an article revealing the story of women and cider by Cath Potter. Freely available, this content aims to help beer and cider lovers learn more about their favourite drink while pubs remain closed across the UK. Read the full story via this link.

If cider is not your cup of tea, there is much more content to explore in the Learn & Discover Zone which will be home to new content from beer writers, educators and experts throughout June and July. Bromley Branch had made arrangements to hold presentation events for the branch Pub and Club of the Year winners, and for the two joint runners-up in the pub competition, however these all had to be postponed due to the lockdown. We are currently in the process of contacting the management of the four venues to discuss alternative arrangements.

# **Surviving Lockdown, Part 3**

Hopefully in the August issue of the Newsletter we'll once again be able to report on what we have been able to drink in the pubs, rather than having to rely on takeaways. In this, the third (and hopefully final) report on drinking during lockdown, we're looking at what draught beers have been on offer in some of the pubs (and club) which were able to open for takeaway, for 'click and collect', or even for home delivery.



Social media has proved to be very useful during lockdown, as a simple means for pubs to keep their customers informed about their revised opening hours and which beers were on offer. Most of the photos on this and the next two pages are taken from social media or websites.

The Bromley Branch Club of the Year, **Orpington Liberal Club**, has been open for takeaways since 25th March,

with a choice of up to four cask beers being available. Over the 3 months, in excess of 40 different beers were on offer from more than 20 breweries, including Bexley, Gadds, Iron Pier, Kent, Musket, Tonbridge, and Whitstable.

Branch Pub of the Year, the **Star & Garter**, reopened in early May for takeaway, including 'click and collect' and home delivery. A selection of draught beers (cask and keg) and ciders, plus bottles and cans could be ordered online for collection or local delivery. (There is something surreal about having your beer order delivered to your own front door, by one of the pub's regular barmen...).



The pub has normally had a choice of three cask ales available, which have included beers from Arbor, Bristol Beer Factory, Five Points, Siren, Wild, Wylam and many others.







Both of our 2020 PotY joint runners-up have also been open. In Petts Wood, the **One Inn The Wood** has been offering a takeaway service since late March, and has also been delivering locally to customers who were having to self-isolate at home. With almost-daily Tweets, the pub's customers were kept up to date on the beers available on draught, plus new additions to the range of bottles, cans, and mini-casks. Apparently their '*Dark Beer Thursday*' special beers were particularly popular; ordering in advance was often essential, otherwise you risked disappointment.











Meanwhile, in Hayes the **Real Ale Way** reopened for takeaway on 22 April.



Up to 4 cask ales were available, plus draught ciders, cans, bottles, plus a range of mini casks in almost industrial quantities. The selection included beers from Bexley, Iron Pier, Kent, Larkins, Tonbridge, and from several other Kent-based microbreweries.



A number of pubs, in addition to selling beers to take away, also offered fresh fruit and veg for sale. This included the **Alma** in Crystal Palace, **Change of Horses** in Farnborough, and the **Queen's Head** in Downe.





The **Craft Metropolis** in Penge was open throughout, selling bottles, cans and draught beer on tap, whilst the **Three Hounds** in Clock House operated a local delivery service, and in late June reopened for takeaways.



And, not far away, **Southey Brewing** reopened their Penge taproom for takeaways, with customers being able to order online for 'click and collect', or for local home delivery.





In Biggin Hill, the **Old Jail** made use of CAMRA's Brew2You app to enable customers to order online for collection, with draught beer and 5 litre minicasks on offer.

The **Bitter End Bar** in Bromley South has been open for takeaway during most of the period, and for home delivery via their associated company beerbarrels2U.



And in early June, the **Craft Beer Rooms** in Hayes (formerly the Pie & Pint) reopened on Fridays and Saturdays for takeaways, with beers on tap and in cans.



Some pubs were open for predominantly food-based offerings, and their websites and social media contained numerous photos of very tempting plates of food. Some of the pubs doing food to take away included the **Alexandra** in Penge, **Imperial** in Chislehurst, **Shortlands Tavern** and the **Rose & Crown** in Green St Green.

## Some pubs will be continuing to open for takeaway only after 4th July

It is already apparent that some of pubs are not going to be able to open for the time being, due to the difficulties of providing a suitable safe environment for customers and staff, even with one metre distancing, due to insufficient space in smaller pubs.

Bromley CAMRA will aim to keep WhatPub and the Covid-19 page on the website as up to date as possible over the coming weeks as the situation develops.



# On your beer-bike!

One of the greatest pleasures in my life was long hikes in the local countryside, stopping on the way at any village pubs I could find for refreshing beers and occasionally a cider.

A recent relaxation of the Covid lockdown rules now allow us to do country walks again, but we can't use public transport for leisure journeys, which makes it nigh on impossible for a linear ramble. The village pubs have been forced to close anyway, so my usual "pint per mile" walks are out of the



question. However, we are blessed in our borough that a few pubs with an off-sales licence, and likewise micro-pubs, are doing takeaways. There are currently around 15 in total. So the beer is there if you can get to it. (See our <u>Covid-19 page</u>).

So, just what will a beer-drinker do to get decent ale during the lockdown? Well, in my case, this has meant refurbishing my old push bike to cycle around the local countryside and buy beer from as many of the takeaways that I can - one at a time of course!

Bromley is surprisingly rural in parts and it has been a real pleasure to cycle along the country lanes and through our lovely villages, with always a welcome purchase of takeaway beer before I pedal back home. And of course, upon my return I can give myself a nice reward as soon as I get the bike back in the shed.

So why not have a read of my cycle beer trips <u>here</u> and discover the joys of beer drinking and cycling - although not done concurrently of course!

Keep your eye on the web page for I will be updating it with new cycle adventures until our pubs are finally open again.

Once the pubs reopen, please don't forget to submit your scores.


