Welcome to the March e-Newsletter

This e-Newsletter was being prepared as the Prime Minister announced his 'roadmap' for the easing of restrictions. We were probably all disappointed, if not surprised, to hear that the earliest date when pubs and clubs might open in any form is 12th April, for outdoor areas and takeaways only, and then possibly 17th May for indoors.

So, it is with apologies that I bring you this slightly thinner than normal edition of the e-Newsletter. We do have a number of features planned about Bromley's pubs, clubs and breweries; however these have all been put on hold (just like our lives...?) until we are once again allowed to enjoy a pint or two in one of the many excellent pubs/clubs in our area.

At a national level CAMRA has continued to campaign, urging the government to provide ongoing financial support for pubs until they can fully reopen and once again trade at full capacity. Whilst we might be looking forward to the easing of restrictions in April/May, there is growing concern about how many pubs/clubs will be able to viably approach in the year restricted manner that is currently aprice

operate in the very restricted manner that is currently anticipated to be allowed.

The Budget is due to take place just a couple of days after the publication of this edition of the e-Newsletter. CAMRA has been urging the Chancellor to include the following measures:

- A lower rate of duty on draught beer, to encourage people back into pubs when they reopen
- An extension to the VAT cut, and for it to apply to alcohol sales as well as food
- Cancellation of business rates for another year
- Furlough extended until every pub is properly open again

If you are reading this after 3rd March, you will already know whether any further financial support is to be offered to pubs...

Committee and AGM News

In a normal year the Bromley Branch AGM would be held in March, however, as with much else at the moment, things are going to have to be done a bit differently this year.

Your branch Committee has continued to meet during lockdown, although we now use Zoom, rather than the traditional meetings held upstairs, or in a back room, at a pub somewhere in Bromley. Even with the pubs and clubs shut, there has still been a lot of business for the Committee to discuss.

Zoom, despite the almost-inevitable occasional problems with connectivity

issues, muting etc, has proved to be a very efficient means to conduct essential business, although sadly the once-normal pre- / post-meeting chatting in the bar over a beer or two can no longer happen. A cat (Bella) and baby (Robert, just turned one) were both briefly attendees at the recent meeting.

The Committee generally meets monthly, the most recent meeting being on 23rd February, where one of the topics being discussed was the arrangements for the 2021 branch AGM. In recent years the Bromley Branch AGM has been held in March; in 2020 we managed to have the meeting just a matter of days before the pubs and clubs were forced to shut and the start of the first lockdown.

The announcement of the 'Roadmap' on 22nd February confirmed that it will not be possible for us to have a face-to-face AGM this year, therefore arrangements are now being made for the meeting to be held via Zoom, or equivalent.

The meeting will now be held on **Saturday 10th April** at **3pm**. Full details on how to join this virtual meeting will be sent to members by email in mid-March.

Brewery News



During February, the new brewing kit was installed at BR3WERY in Kent House, although (as at late February) the first beer had yet to be brewed using the new kit.

In the meantime, the taproom is offering takeaway service, featuring brews from various London microbreweries.

In future issues of the e-Newsletter (once the pubs & clubs have reopened) we are planning to publish features on each of Bromley's breweries, including interviews with the brewers.

The Bromley CAMRA Website


The Branch Webmaster reminds us that there is a lot interesting information available for members on the Bromley CAMRA website.

In normal circumstances, one of the most important sections of the





One of these is our "Bromley Pub Walks" page which currently lists around 30 walks, mainly through the leafier parts of the borough with occasional forays into parts of Kent and Surrey that border on our branch area. All of the walks include opportunities for the real ale drinker to enjoy a pint or two, and include detailed route descriptions. More walks are to be added soon.

CAMRA National Chair, Nick Antona, has welcomed this report on behalf of CAMRA, going on to say that the Chancellor's upcoming budget is the perfect opportunity to commit to a long-term financial support package for pubs and breweries to see them through the long months ahead.

One from North of the border. The Scottish Government has advised that hospitality businesses will not pay Business Rates for the full 2021/22 financial year after new funding was made available. In noting this, Joe Crawford, the CAMRA Scotland Director, perhaps echoing the CAMRA National Chair's comments, added that CAMRA is urging the Chancellor to use the Budget to help pubs thrive – continue the VAT reduction, extend it to alcohol, to benefit traditional locals that do not serve food and to see a lower rate of duty on beer served on tap in pubs and clubs.

Now I wrote this before the budget; you will be probably be reading it after the budget, was there (any) good news?.....

Have you yet looked at <u>Learn & Discover</u> on the CAMRA national website? If not, you are missing out on a vast amount of well-presented information about beer and ciders, brewing and cider making.



Some of the content is in the form of audio guides, whilst others are in written format, supported with many photographs.

More content is being regularly added. Currently there are 12 guides related to <u>beer</u>, some of the beer topics covered include:

The 'Discover' section covers various topics in greater depth, for example *India Pale Ale, a history*. This guides attempts to find the truth about the world's possibly most contentious beer style IPA, India Pale Ale.

Through this review of the origins of India Pale Ale Pete Brown aims to cut through the conjecture, bust myths and provide you with an authoritative account of one of the most profitable and popular beer styles of all time."

- Barrel-aging and conditioning

Beer by Design


