



Keeping WhatPub up-to-date. Your help is needed.

With pubs and clubs now reopened for business following the Covid lockdowns, our Pub Database Administrator is asking members of Bromley Branch to assist in getting the information up to date on WhatPub.

As lockdown progressively loosens its grip on the pub trade, we at Bromley CAMRA are trying to make sure that the information that we display on our WhatPub pages is up-to-date. It's obviously not satisfactory if WhatPub users arrive at a pub and don't find the beers they expect or - worse - that the pub isn't open. We have found that many pubs are not keeping the same hours that they used to prior to lockdown, and also that the beer range is often reduced, or changed.



With well over 100 entries on WhatPub for our branch area, this is a difficult task to accomplish quickly unless we get help from our members.

So what we would like you to do, is if you visit any of the pubs or clubs in our borough, please check that that the opening hours as shown on WhatPub are correct, and also that our description of the beer range is accurate.

The picture on the left shows the WhatPub entry for the Red Lion, with the arrows pointing to the information that we most urgently need to be checked.

Obviously if you see anything else that needs correcting, we would also be interested in that as well.

To send us updates, please either use the 'submit updates' button on the WhatPub screen, or send an email to me. Attaching a photo of the hours, or the pumpclip range is absolutely fine!

Outstanding Pub Conversions and Restorations

News about a new national initiative by CAMRA to recognise and celebrate pubs where there has been a high quality of restoration or conversion.

CAMRA is dedicated to supporting pubs, as well as promoting best-quality beers and ciders. In particular, we are widely regarded for our work on identifying and helping to protect the UK's most important heritage pubs through the compilation of our inventories of pubs with historic interiors – the most precious survivors.

CAMRA defines heritage pubs as those that are wholly or mostly unchanged or retain important historic rooms or features from before 1970. Since then, huge numbers of pubs have been expertly refurbished and many have been established in buildings previously used for other purposes. And, contrary to popular belief, a lot of new pubs in both urban and rural locations are really good. They deserve to be recognised and applauded.

CAMRA has therefore begun a project to identify, preserve and protect pubs that are considered to be *Outstanding Conversions and Restorations* (OCR). These are the best examples of pub owners taking care to present a pub for modern times, whilst respecting the origins of the building in which it is located. Or, they have taken care to refashion a pub so that it has a genuinely historical feel and/or has design to admire. All pubs included have that essential quality of, well, pubbiness.

Why is CAMRA doing this?

- 1. To raise awareness of examples of outstanding pub conversions and restorations, thus stimulating interest in visiting and enjoying them.
- 2. To inspire pub owners and others to pursue excellence when converting or restoring buildings for pub use.
- 3. Thereby to establish yardsticks against which future pub conversions and restorations can be judged.
- 4. To help protect identified pubs from unsympathetic changes.
- 5. To contribute to CAMRA's wider objective of generating enthusiasm for pub-going.

Which pubs near here are on the list?

In Bromley Branch area, only one pub has so far been identified as being worthy of inclusion, the <u>Partridge</u> in Bromley High St. This Grade II listed former NatWest bank, was converted by Fuller's, and is listed in the 2021 Good Beer Guide.

You can find out more about the project and see the full national listing by using this link. Why not go and enjoy as many of these pubs as you can? Currently there are about 30 'OCR' pubs across Greater London, how many of them have you visited?

CAMRA's Pub Heritage Group have been working for more than thirty years to identify pubs with intact traditional interiors or which have features and rooms of national or regional importance. The London Pubs Group

The Branch Secretary runs through some of the (mostly) non-Covid national and regional news from CAMRA.

Near normality eh, isn't it wonderful? As I sit typing this on a typical Summer afternoon, under an umbrella, which is under a gazebo, I kid you not. Photos are available.

Have you got out and about this last month, or, like me, been pinged and elected to isolate? Trouble was I received the "ping" whilst sitting in one of my favourite pubs. Now what are the rules for that one?

So, in this month of change, what has CAMRA been up to? Well, since you ask:

The return of the authentic pub experience

This could not be passed by, with our National Chair, Nik Antona, commenting on the easing of remaining restrictions in England seeing the much-anticipated return of the authentic pub experience, with ordering and chatting at the bar replacing table service and the rule of six.

Nik went on to comment that this move will help to make sure that our beloved pubs, social clubs and taprooms can survive and thrive on the other side of the pandemic, and continue to play their vital role in our communities.

Of course, there was the now somewhat traditional plea with CAMRA calling on the Chancellor to back our campaign for a differential rate of duty on draught beer, levelling the playing field between the price of beer sold in social, community settings compared with supermarket alcohol consumed at home. Hopefully, at some time, someone in power will listen!

Golden Tickets? Not quite but..

During July, CAMRA awarded 32 pubs and clubs across the country with Golden Awards marking 50 years of our campaigning.

These 32 Pubs include five pubs that had appeared in all 48 editions of the Good Beer Guide, a magnificent achievement in itself; the longest standing community owned pub in the country; and the current Pub of the Year holder. All having been selected from a list of over 240 pubs/clubs nominated by CAMRA members and locals.

Space precludes me from listing here all 32 pubs/clubs. Sadly we have none from our area, but I was pleased to see that one of my all-time favourite pubs, The Berry, in Lower Walmer, near Deal was included. congratulate Chris when next down there!



Treasury tax changes

The trouble is, whilst CAMRA tries to get taxes on the sale of draught beer changed, there remains the issue of the Small Brewer's Relief Scheme. One year on from the Treasury announcement on changes to this scheme, the Society of Independent Brewers (SIBA) has released academic research from Professors Geoff Pugh and David Tyrrall showing the damaging effect that the plans could have on the small brewing sector, and consequently consumer choice. Campaigning

Over the last 16 months or so, many branches, including our own, have seen a fall in the number of members. - £30* <u>CAMRA real ale vouchers</u>, accepted at over 1,500 pubs, including many of those owned by Amber Taverns, SA Brains, Stonegate and JD Wetherspoon, and more. (*£40 for joint membership)
- CAMRA Real Ale Discount Scheme, which provides discounts on pints at over 3,500 participating pubs on production of a valid CAMRA membership card. The CAMRA vouchers and discounts foster responsible drinking and encourage footfall to pubs up and down the country



- Discounts on <u>CAMRA publications</u>, including the annual, bestselling Good Beer Guide
- Free or reduced entry into <u>CAMRA beer festivals</u> nationwide (once restrictions allow for festivals to resume).

Learn and Discover - Beer faults



Well, I mentioned this above in *membership benefits*, and it would be remiss of me not to highlight one of the latest guides available to members.

If, like me, you sometimes want to know more about what makes a good, or a bad, pint (apart from "wow, I'll have another" or "where's the pickles in this?"), the latest guide from CAMRA's *Learn & Discover platform* informs readers about the off flavours that can signify a fault in their pint, and why it is so important to exchange or return it once a fault has been identified.

The guide is written by Katie Mather, a beer blogger-turned-food and drink writer and co-owner of Corto, a neighbourhood beer, natural cider and wine bar in Clitheroe.

Accompanied by the charming illustrations of Lucie Cooke, Katie guides you through the identification of smells and flavours that can be expected, and those that mean something is off.

Home Brewing

This month Charles has been brewing a beer based on the famous Robinson's Old Tom.

Last month I told you how I had constructed a small crane to help with the heavy lifting involved in raising the malt tube from the mash tun after the mashing is over. This month on my beer <u>blog</u> I explain how I put my new crane to good use in making a clone of a very famous dark Barley Wine – Robinson's Old Tom.

Rich, malty and warming, Old Tom has a distinctive deep port wine finish, with bitter hops balanced by the heady aromas of dark fruit. The best things in life improve with age... Good wine, friendships and, of course, Old Tom. Unlike other beers, Old Tom ages beautifully in the bottle (like a fine wine). Consequently, the brew I am doing this month is to be bottled and left to mature, ready to drink for Christmas.

The recipe itself is quite simple and only uses Pale Malt and Crystal Malt, with just a touch of Chocolate Malt for added roastiness. The hop bill is also simple, using good old fashioned Goldings and Fuggles. To help maintain the high ABV of 9.3%, a small amount of brewer's sugar is used.

Sometimes dubbed 'the original craft beer', Robinson's Old Tom is one of the most famous strong beers in ale history. A firm favourite with traditional drinkers, craft enthusiasts and beer judges alike, Old Tom has won the industry's most prestigious awards; including World's Best Ale, World's Best Design and Champion Winter Beer of Britain. The history of Robinson's Brewery in Stockport and the name 'Old Tom' is worthy of mention in itself.

1827 - How It All Began

 William Robinson became landlord of the Unicorn Inn in 1827 and bought the pub in 1838. The Unicorn Inn evolved to become the Unicorn Brewery, in which Old Tom was born.

1899 - Old Tom Is Born

 As the old brewery cat, Tom, basked in the sunshine the head brewer, Alfred Munton sketched him into immortality. Old Tom was first brewed on Wednesday 1st November 1899.

1920 - A New Brew House

New coppers, to boil the wort and hops, were installed in 1920. They worked hard for over 90 years brewing Old Tom, before being replaced in 2012 with the brew house still in use today.

1976 - Unicorn Packaging Centre

 The Unicorn Packaging Centre opens, with a bottling capacity of 850,000 bottles a day, allowing Robinsons to start sharing the now famous Old Tom beer with the rest of the world.

1985 - Old Tom's 50+ Awards

 Old Tom wins the first of over fifty awards in the 1985 'Brewing Industry International Awards'. Amongst other accolades, it's been crowned 'Champion Beer of Britain' and 'World's best ale'.
