# Welcome to the January 2022 e-Newsletter

Happy New Year!

This e-Newsletter was finalised during the 'Twixmas' period between Christmas and New Year. For many people these few days used to be something of a 'nothing' time, possibly a brief respite between the excess of Christmas and the resumption of the excess planned for New Year. Probably many of us used to lose track of what day of the week it was (although for me, that became the standard situation for weeks on end during the periods of lockdown).

During December 2021, as Christmas approached, the news appeared to be getting ever gloomier, as the Omicron variant spread rapidly. We start with the meeting to select our recommendations for the next Good Beer Guide, and then it is the deadline for members to nominate their favourite pub and/or club for the 2022 branch Pub & Club of the Year award. 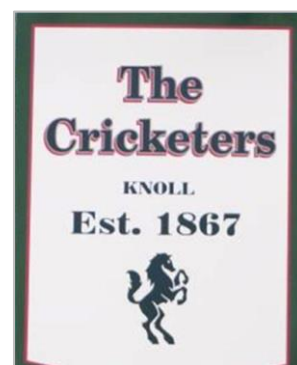
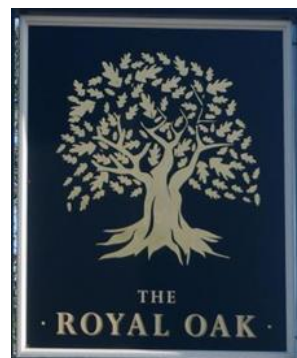

The process has started to select the Bromley CAMRA Pub and Club of the Year for 2022.

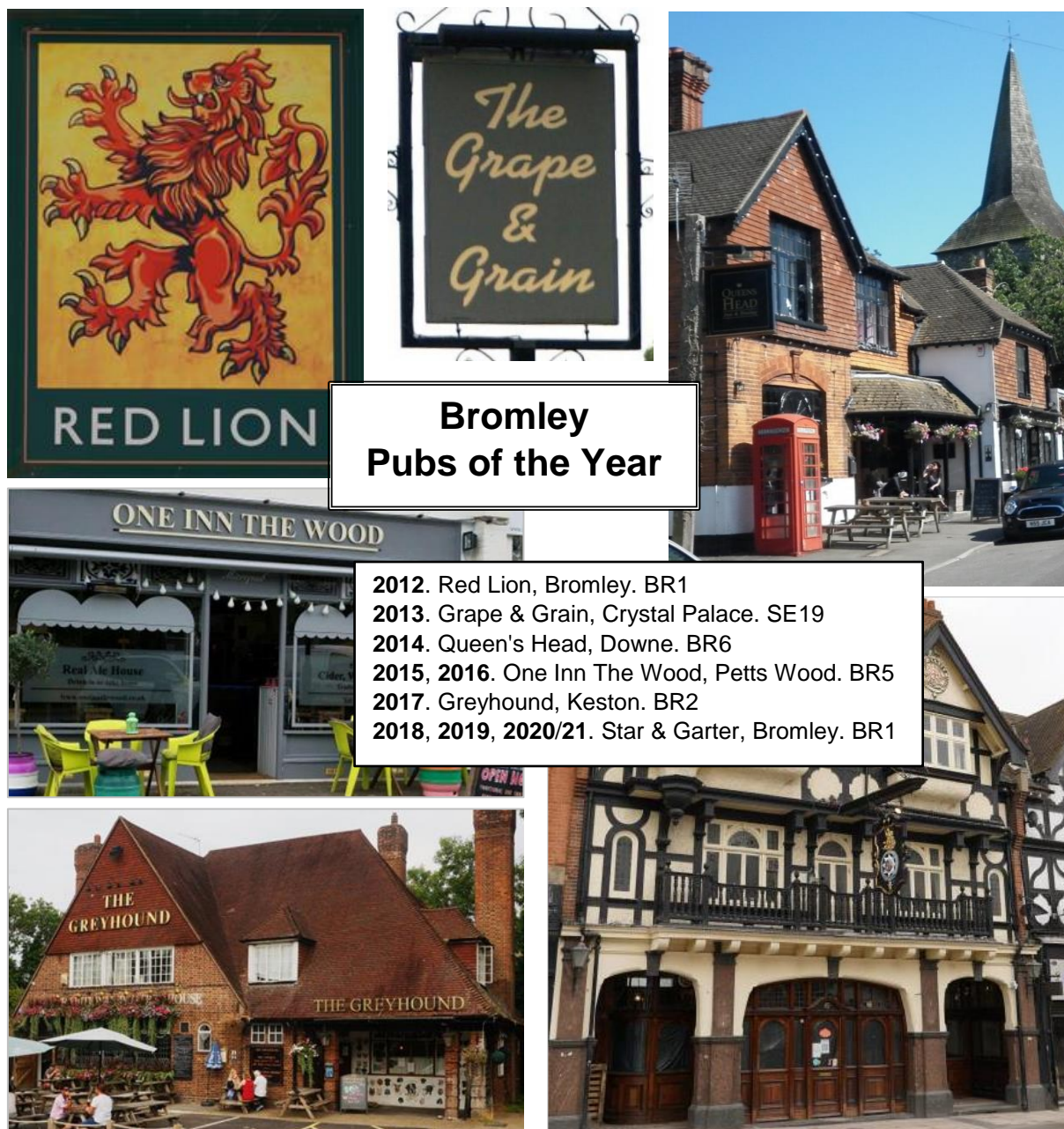
If you have not yet nominated your favourite pub and/or club, there is still time to do so. You can also still volunteer to join the judging panel.

**Good Beer Guide 2021. Featured Pub of the Month**

The 2021 Good Beer Guide includes 10 entries for Bromley. As a new feature in the e-Newsletter, each month we will be focussing on one of the entries. This month our BR6 Area Representative describes the Five Bells in Chelsfield Village.

There can be few pubs in Greater London that can be truly described as an unspoilt village pub, but the Five Bells in Chelsfield must be very close to the top of that list.

This Grade II Listed pub is in the middle of picturesque Chelsfield Village, a Conservation Area, and home to a small primary school and the St. Martin of Tours church. The pub is in the heart of the village and gets its name from the bells at the parish church.

Adrian ('Ade') and Kay Stone have been running the Five Bells since 2005. This year their pub has made a welcome return to the Good Beer Guide, however, it had previously been listed in every edition of the guide between 2007 and 2017. In 2010 it was selected as the South East London CAMRA Branch Pub of the Year (Bromley CAMRA did not exist at that time) and was runner-up for the Bromley award in 2013. The pub is recorded on the CAMRA Regional Inventory of Historic Pub Interiors as being a 'historic pub interior of some regional importance'. The Five Bells is very much part of the local community, used by various local groups, such as drama, darts, and singing.

The pub was named after the bells. The story goes that the bells were used for its bell ringing and won many prizes. It originally had four bells, but to go bigger and better for the fifth bell, the pub was built and now has eight bells and still enters bell ringing competitions, but there are no plans to change the name of the pub.

The pub still has a large TV usually used to show sports. The separate Saloon Bar, whilst also welcoming drinkers, is the pub's restaurant area, with the capacity to seat 45-50 diners (in pre-Covid days). Up to 4 cask ales are available, normally the regular beer is Courage Best Bitter, which is typically joined by a selection of Butcombe, Otter, Tribute or Landlord. The pub offers bar and restaurant menus, with food cooked to order using locally-sourced ingredients. The walls of both bars have many framed old photographs of the village, including several featuring the pub.

Inevitably, there have had to be some changes made due to Covid; this includes a one-way system in both bars, extra hand washing facilities and the provision of a large heated marquee to increase the seating capacity. Sadly, the regular charity quiz nights, darts matches and live music events have had to be postponed for the time being, but will hopefully return once the pandemic is under control.

# Bromley CAMRA Beckenham Beer & Cider Festival 2022

*Covid restrictions have meant two years without our festival, but we are planning to be back this year.*

Our much missed and loved Beckenham Beer & Cider Festival is back! Don't panic over what you have recently heard and read about the 'Omicron' variant of the Coronavirus disease. Attendance at our beer festival has always been well under the 500 per day mark, so not withstanding any unforeseen future restrictions by the government, you won't need a Covid passport or any testing to attend. CAMRA and local branches are also introducing new processes to make sure festivals are Covid secure. You will be able to safely experience the sheer joy of being at a beer festival once more. I am sure we have all missed the social benefits of a festival drink with family and friends.

The Festival will be taking place in July 2022 at the Beckenham Rugby Club, Balmoral Avenue, BR3 3RD. The dates to put in your diaries are **Thurs 28<sup>th</sup> July to Sat 30<sup>th</sup> July 2022.**

Planning for our beer festival is already well underway. The venue and the marquee are booked and the Festival Planning Team has been looking at the beer selection and the catering vendors we will need. Some early important organising roles have been assigned and, in response to the November branch email to members, we have had 18 people offer to be volunteers. Thanks to everyone who has volunteered so far, **BUT MORE VOLUNTEERS ARE NEEDED.**

In particular, we need people who have an '*Emergency First Aid at Work*' qualification, or equivalent, to be on site during the 5 festival days (that's one day set-up, three public days, and one day take-down). We need a minimum of two such qualified people each day to cover our legal Health & Safety responsibilities, but we can be flexible over the hours and days that you can commit. I am sure that some of our branch members already have this qualification courtesy of their employer, so please step forward and volunteer to work at your festival. These are vital roles to cover – if we cannot get First Aiders, we cannot have a festival.



Of course, other volunteers are still needed to act as stewards, bar staff, on the membership stall, on the entrance counter, and other areas. You will be able to choose what hours and days you work and during your working shifts food and drinks benefits will also be available to you. As well as a lot of fun, you will be working with a dynamic team dedicated to giving our festival visitors a great time with their family and friends. If you've not done this kind of thing before, don't worry as training and support will be given.

## Pub, Club, Brewery News

*A round-up of news from Bromley Branch's Area Pub/Club Contacts and Brewery Liaison Officers.*

### Bromley North

On Monday 6 December the Red Lion received a CAMRA Special Award to mark its 25<sup>th</sup> consecutive year in CAMRA's Good Beer Guide (GBG). Run by licensees Chris and Siobhan Humphrey since 1993, it is the only pub in Bromley to have featured in every edition of the GBG from 1998 to 2022. In expectation of the special occasion, the pub was bustling with regulars and Branch members, including our Honorary President Bob Gray. The Award Certificate was presented by Charles Tucker, Chair of Bromley CAMRA.

In making the presentation speech, Charles said that very few pubs accomplish the 25 year GBG accolade and that it was actually their second 'Silver' anniversary, explaining they had commemorated 25 years of successfully running the pub in 1918. Charles remarked that a good pub management record like this was also rare. Calling for everyone to raise their glasses in a celebratory toast, Charles said he hoped Siobhan and Chris would be running the Red Lion for many years to come, and praised them for their support for CAMRA over the years.

Siobhan and Chris replied they were proud to be in the GBG for 25 years and very honoured to receive the award, adding they were grateful that CAMRA had recognised their efforts to maintain top-quality beers in a traditional pub atmosphere.

As a boost to the celebratory theme, Siobhan and Chris then brought out magnificent platters of sandwiches with savouries and invited everyone to dive-in. This was accompanied by the serving at our tables of a free pint! Their hospitality was most unexpected and appreciated by all, and a reminder of what exceptional licensees they are. It was great CAMRA night out and Siobhan and Chris showed that they were very worthy winners of the Special Award.

### Petts Wood

I've been a member of CAMRA for many years now and have done many beer related outings, from attending the AGM, working at beer festivals and going on many brewery tours, but there is one thing missing - a book signing/beer tasting evening. That all changed when I heard that One Inn The Wood in Petts Wood had organised one in early December. Des De Moor, author of the *London's Best Beer Pubs and Bars* book, now in its 3rd edition, was the guest and also Paul Anspach, one of the founders of Anspach and Hobday.

Tickets sold out very quickly and I only just managed to get one. Due to the size of One Inn The Wood, numbers had to be limited to 31. The evening got off to a good start with Des saying how keen he was to visit One Inn The Wood, as it was one of his featured top recommended places to go in his book.

His book is packed full of knowledge and detail, and during the evening Des's love of all things beer-related shone through; the history of types of beer, malts/yeast used, and pubs in general. Des gave a brief chat on how the evening would be structured and the types and style of beer we would be tasting and finally that he would sell and sign books at the end of the evening. The lovely Anspach and Hobday tasting glasses and beer started to be handed out.

Paul Anspach then introduced himself and gave us a quick run through on the history of Anspach and Hobday. Paul Anspach and Jack Hobday were school friends who shared a flat at university and started home brewing. Once they left university they wanted to do something different, hence Anspach and Hobday being born. At first they rented an arch in Druid Street, part of the Bermondsey beer mile, with Bullfinch brewery (now in Herne Hill) but as things boomed they moved the majority of their production to Croydon. This has tripled capacity. During lockdown Anspach and Hobday moved more into cans as most of their beer went to pubs. This considerably helped the business weather the storm of Covid-19.

We then moved on to the beers we were trying that evening – The Lager (4.7%) and inspired by a German Helles lager, The Pale Ale (4.4%) with Citra, Mosaic and Simcoe hops, The London ESB (5.5%), originally based on a collaboration with Fullers and The Porter (6.7%), the first beer they brewed and their flagship beer.

Each beer was tasted and discussed, with many questions asked and answered fully by Des and Paul. A question which I particular found interesting related to the artwork that features on the cans. Paul said that their branding always had one foot in the past hence the dual people on each can from different eras.

As the evening drew to a close, a special beer was produced – *The Brother Sean* (8.3%), a 2017 bottle-aged Belgian stout, which was a fantastic beer to end the evening on.

Many thanks to One Inn The Wood for organising such an interesting and informative evening and Paul and Des for giving up their time so readily and answering a barrage of questions. I'm looking forward to the next one.

# CAMRA News

*The Branch Secretary runs through some of the national and regional news from CAMRA.*

I am writing this to meet a pre-festive season deadline, so I do hope that everyone had an enjoyable Christmas and New Year. With the uncertainty relating to hospitality, did you get a chance to pop in at your local? At least I was able to get to the Pigs Ear festival earlier in December. Although appearing quieter than in past years it was, I understand, a success. Let's hope that we are similarly able to enjoy beer festivals in 2022; planning continues for ours although it is with regret that the Great British Beer Festival (Winter) was cancelled.

But back to CAMRA and issues arising in December.

## Covid related

Many of us were concerned with the Government's issue of a warning for consumers to stay away from pubs. To see the state of pubs in the city is to ring alarm bells about the sustainability of many of our favourite haunts. As an example, annually a group of my (former) colleagues have a Christmas crawl and curry and this year's crawl really highlighted the problems pubs are having. The [Jerusalem Tavern](#), a lovely little pub near Farringdon is one of our regular visits and in previous years, we have stood outside and 'volunteered' someone to get to the bar. This year we went in and sat beside the open fire, on a FRIDAY!

Of course, worry about our health is a sensible approach, but CAMRA has expressed concern with the Government's present approach. That there needs to be an understanding of the severity of the situation for pubs, social clubs, brewers and cider makers and that it is imperative Governments across the UK exercise extreme caution and understand the impact of any statements that they make about cancelling social plans.

Following this statement, CAMRA has now demanded an immediate support package to compensate for loss of trade, highlighting that we are now back in the same and wholly unacceptable situation of March 2020 where pubs were put in lockdown by proxy as public were warned to stay away. That there must be an urgent delivery of a new package of support. Fingers crossed!

## Learn and Discover

& landlady of [The Hop Inn](#) micropub in Hornchurch, recently announced as the Greater London Regional Pub of the Year.

### Drink Green

And by this title, I am not referring to the annual *Green Hop Festival* but to the need for conservation and what better to look for but the longest serving beer cask!

Accordingly, CAMRA is now on the lookout for four champions of the cask world:

- The oldest cask in circulation;
- The cask with the highest number of reuses
- The cask with the highest number of refills in a year
- The cask with the lowest number of “beer miles” for each refill.



While casks can remain in use for decades, the reality is that casks are often taken out of circulation far sooner through theft, misappropriation, or being unnecessarily scrapped for raw materials. Containers falling out of use early represent not only an environmental cost, but also a financial one too – with brewers bearing the loss of millions of pounds worth of casks and kegs each year.

As CAMRA go on to point out, “Cask beer is the ultimate no-waste option, and we hope brewers will take this opportunity to not only celebrate this, but also help CAMRA highlight just how much potential there is for consumers to ‘Drink Greener’!”

Now I do not know how this is to be monitored, but I look forward to seeing the results!

### Small Brewers’ relief

There is not enough to space allow to me to go into depth on this, but a quick online search will probably provide as much detail as you need. However, following the announcement by the Government on 30<sup>th</sup> November, our CAMRA National Chair commented that small brewers had been waiting months for the statement; that although there are bold changes, there is more detail to be worked upon; acknowledgement of a concession on the 50% relief threshold and, whilst the changes will protect around 70% of the smallest brewers from increased tax bills, there will still be increased bills for brewers producing between 2,500 and 5,000 HL per year.

In closing, Nik Antona added that *“CAMRA will continue to campaign across a range of issues affecting small and independent brewers, as they are vital to maintaining consumer choice in the UK beer market, which is increasingly dominated by the interests of a small number of global brewing companies.”*

### Punch Pubs

With the news that the Punch pubs business has been sold to an investment group, Fortress Investment. CAMRA have issued a statement confirming our concern about an investment company taking over a business which runs so many pubs up and down the country. Punch was already owned by a global business, however CAMRA continues to be concerned by the dominance of global companies and brewers in the UK beer and pub market.

Our National Chair added that whilst one company controlling a large share of the market rarely brings benefits for licensees or consumers, CAMRA hopes that the new owners will commit to retaining the pub portfolio.

So, my comment, will they, or will there be an asset-stripping exercise? Only time can tell.

And, on that note, I sign off wishing you all a good and healthy 2022.
