




Good Beer Guide 2023

The 50th edition of CAMRA's flagship publication has now been published. This edition welcomes a new Bromley entry, the Cockpit micropub in Chislehurst.

The Cockpit micropub first opened in late December 2020, during the height of the Covid pandemic. For several months, the lockdown restrictions meant that they were only able to supply beers for home delivery, however, in April 2021 the restrictions eased to allow drinking outside. Then on 17th May 2021 customers were actually allowed to enjoy a drink inside the pub.

A possibly unique feature of this micropub is that it shares the premises with a florist's shop. The pub's name is derived from the cockpit on the nearby Chislehurst Common.

The pub is run by Paul Steadman and Rick Hone, now with Adam Miller as manager; many members will remember Adam from his time as manager at One Inn The Wood.

Up to seven cask ales are normally available, all served by gravity from a cold room, which is visible through a window behind the bar.

The house beer is Pit, a hoppy pale ale specially brewed for the pub by Brithop. The other ales available will usually be a range of beer styles, including a stout or porter. sourced mainly (but not exclusively) from small breweries in London and Kent. Many of the beers are 'LocAle'. Brews from two of

Bromley's breweries, Mutineers and Marlix, are regularly available. Adam says that they feature "an eclectic range of cask, with the aim that no two beers are the same".

The pub serves real, whole juice cider, with ciders from local cideries, such as Nightingale and Ascension, and from further afield, including Oliver's, Pilton and Little Pomona. Adam is very enthusiastic about the ciders they have available: "We focus on serving the best cider the country has to offer, both by draught and from the bottle, being in constant conversation with quality cider makers about the future and evolution of the industry."

For those who fancy something a little stronger, the pub also stocks a range of gins from Wessex Gins, a small, family-run, craft gin distillery in Surrey. The company recently won the title of 'UK Gin Producer of the Year 2022' at the International Wine & Spirits Competition.

During the period of Covid restrictions the Cockpit, along with several neighbouring hospitality premises, obtained approval from the Council to provide temporary outdoor seating areas, in what had previously been parking bays. The temporary licence for this has now been extended, and there are hopes that it might be made permanent. There are several locations within the borough where such temporary licences have been approved, however the effect in Chislehurst has been particularly noticeable, where the conversion of several of the former parking bays has created a vibrant 'café culture' atmosphere in Royal Parade.





Fifty Years of Bromley in the Good Beer Guide

Last month saw the publication of the fiftieth edition of the Good Beer Guide.

The first edition of CAMRA's Good Beer Guide (GBG) was published in 1974 and included just one pub in the Bromley area, the <u>Bull's Head</u> in Chislehurst.

Over the years in Bromley, a total of **67** pubs, two clubs and one off-licence have been listed in the guide. Sadly, twelve of these venues are now permanently closed; in most cases the sites have been redeveloped. There are also a number of other previously

listed pubs which do still exist, however they no longer serve real ale.

Bizarrely, as mentioned in the October 2020 e-Newsletter, in 2000 and 2001, a pub which is actually within the county of Kent was somehow listed in the Guide as a Bromley pub!

Bromley has a good selection of pubs serving beers from Ind Coope, Courage, Charrington, Shepherd Neame, Young, Fuller and Watney

In **1978** there were nine Bromley pubs listed and included the above comment.

The most frequently listed Bromley pub is the <u>Jolly Woodman</u> in Beckenham, having appeared in a total of 34 editions, over various years between 1976 and 2015. However, it is the <u>Red Lion</u> in Bromley North which holds the record for being the Bromley pub with the most consecutive entries; GBG 2023 being the 26th consecutive year in the guide for this excellent back street local run by Chris and Siobhan Humphrey.

There are currently more than 90 pubs and eligible clubs in Bromley which serve real ale. Many of these venues offer

ales that are of sufficiently high quality to warrant them being listed in the GBG. However, Bromley's current allocation in the Guide is only ten slots; this means that some very difficult decisions need to be made each year at the branch's GBG Selection Meeting. In the <u>previous issue</u> of the e-Newsletter we described how Bromley CAMRA selects pubs and clubs for inclusion in the GBG.

Why do we have a Branch Committee?

Bromley CAMRA is run entirely by volunteers. We have a brief look at what your Branch Committee does.

CAMRA, as with many voluntary organisations has a structure which involves a 'local', 'regional' and 'national' presence. CAMRA is democratically run, with all members being able to vote to elect members of the National Executive, and to attend the AGM of their local branch to vote on who will sit on the Branch Committee. It is the National Executive, led by current National Chair Nik Antona, which initiates all the national campaigning, however local campaigning is run by each of CAMRA's more than 200 branches.

Who sits on the Branch Committee?

The Bromley Branch Committee currently has 21 members, covering a total of 28 different roles; some members having more than one role. There are the four 'key' roles: the Chair; Secretary; Membership Secretary and Treasurer, plus several roles relating to the various campaigning activities and the promotion of CAMRA. In addition we have our nine 'Area Pub & Club Contacts'.

What does the Branch Committee do?


The Committee meets regularly, with ten meetings per year; meetings are normally held in an upstairs or back room at a pub or club. However, throughout the year, members of the Committee are working on their allotted area(s) of responsibility.

The work of the Committee and its members includes:

- Updating the pub/club information for WhatPub
- Distributing London Drinker magazine to pubs/clubs
- Arranging the selection of the branch Pub & Club of the Year
- Arranging the selection of pubs for the GBG
- Organising the beer festival
- Campaigning for pub protection
- Supporting and promoting local pubs, clubs & breweries
- Liaising with licensees via our network of Area Pub and Club Contacts
- Arranging social events for members
- Producing the monthly e-Newsletter



The Committee continued to meet (via Zoom) throughout the period when meetings could not be held in pubs/clubs.









How long do Committee members stay in post?

CAMRA's constitution requires that the entire committee stands down at each AGM and that a new committee is then elected by the members of the branch at the AGM.

In many cases, the same postholders are reelected for a further term. However inevitably some committee members do decide not to seek re-election for various reasons, therefore, in most years, at least one new member has joined the Branch Committee. If a vacancy occurs during the year, the Committee can co-opt a member to join the Committee to take over the vacant post.

Several members of the current Branch Committee have held committee roles ever since Bromley Branch relaunched in 2011, and some of them have given us advance notice that they intend to stand down at the next AGM (in March

2023). This means that there will probably be several posts which will need to be filled.

In a couple of weeks time, we'll be sending an email to all members about these anticipated vacancies. However, in the meantime, do please drop an email to the <u>Branch Secretary</u> if you think that you might be interested in joining the Branch Committee.



The 358 Bus Crawl

The 358 bus route, at approx. 16 miles is one of London's longest. However, for Bromley's drinkers, more than half of our area's real ale pubs and clubs can be reached by using this service. This month we start a three-part series looking at the pubs/clubs along the route.



Part One. Crystal Palace, Anerley, Penge, Beckenham, Eden Park.

Crystal Palace is the boundary of several London Boroughs. It is also the boundary of three CAMRA branches, this means that only one of the five pubs in the *'Crystal Palace Triangle'* is actually within Bromley, this being the Alma.

The former <u>Grape & Grain</u> remains closed and boarded up. JD Wetherspoon acquired the site several years ago, and eventually got planning permission to extend the pub, including building on the adjacent site at the corner of Anerley Hill and Church Rd, a site which has been vacant since WW2 bomb damage. It is currently not known when (or if?) Wetherspoons intend to proceed with this development.

Pubs in the Crystal Palace Triangle

(Listed in a clockwise direction, following the one-way traffic system)

- Alma
- White Hart
- Sparrowhawk
- Royal Albert
- Westow House

There are other pubs; however they do not currently sell cask ales.



Down the hill in Anerley is the <u>Douglas Fir</u>, run by Gipsy Hill Brewery. Sadly, there are also several permanently closed pubs in this area, with the buildings now converted to other uses, or demolished and redeveloped. The closed pubs include: <u>Paxton Arms</u>, <u>Thicket Tavern</u>, and <u>Robin Hood</u>; the latter is now the site of an Aldi supermarket.

The bus next gets to Penge, where the first pub is the <u>Maple Tree</u> in Maple Rd. (Nearest bus stop is Avenue Rd.). Back in the 1980s, Maple Rd was a 'destination' for real ale drinkers, however sadly, now only the Maple Tree survives. (See the <u>September 2020</u> e-Newsletter to read more about Maple Rd.)

One stop further takes us to the <u>Goldsmiths Arms</u>, <u>Pawleyne Arms</u>, <u>Southey Brewery Tap</u> and the <u>Crooked Billet</u>. Then just one stop around the corner is Wetherspoon's <u>Moon & Stars</u>.

Next comes the Clock House area of Beckenham, with the <u>Three Hounds Beer Café</u>. In Beckenham, the bus turns right at the War Memorial, but if you leave the bus here and walk along the High St you have the choice of four pubs, <u>Bricklayers Arms</u>, <u>Coach & Horses</u>, <u>George Inn and Manor House</u>.

Just before reaching the Elmers End is <u>Beckenham Rugby Football Club</u>, home to our branch's beer & cider festival, and where CAMRA members are welcome at the bar as guests. Just beyond the roundabout is the <u>Elm Tree</u>, previously known as William IV.

The final pubs in this section are the <u>Eden Park</u>, the Toby Carvery, just opposite Eden Park Station, and then after a further two stops, <u>Club Langley</u>.

The small print, what is '10 minutes walk'?

We are aware that people walk at different speeds, and therefore 'the 10 minutes' measure used in this series should therefore only be taken as being approximate. Thank you to some of our Pub/Club Contacts, and others, who actually went to check some of the timings, as part of the preparation for this series.



New electric buses for the 358 route

We understand that trials will be starting soon of a new fleet of battery-powered buses, to replace the existing diesel vehicles on this route.

The buses to be used will not be the 'big battery' type, as being introduced elsewhere, since the route length is too long. Instead these new buses will be able to be charged whilst they are waiting at the Orpington or Crystal Palace terminus, at the end of each journey.


