Good Beer Guide Selection Meeting

This month we have the meeting where we select the Bromley entries for the next issue of the Good Beer Guide.

Almost at the stroke of midnight on Christmas Eve (well, 11.59 pm to be precise), the 2022 beer scoring year ended. And all those beer scores kindly submitted by yourselves are then processed and churned to produce the data we need to decide which 20 candidates will make it onto the shortlist, from the nearly 100 pubs and clubs that serve cask ale within the Bromley CAMRA area.

To make it onto the shortlist, we use the top 20 pub and clubs with the highest total average beer scores calculated from the data. To qualify, they must have a minimum of:

- 10 beer scores,
- from a minimum of 5 members,
- over 4 calendar months within 2022.

And then we have a jolly good meeting with some beer ...

The Good Beer Guide Selection Meeting is open to all Bromley CAMRA members and will be held on **Monday 9th January**, now starting at the later time of **8 pm** (*ahem, a slight overlap with a Pilates class being avoided!*) in the upstairs meeting room at the [Chancery](#), 90 Bromley Road, Beckenham, BR3 5NP. Please bring your membership card.

I will be hosting this meeting, whereby we have a (very) brief discussion on the relative merits of each of the 20 candidates before having a vote on the 10 entries to be put forward for the Good Beer Guide 2024 edition. We will also be selecting two reserves just in case any of the 10 successful entries have to be rejected for any reason, such as change in management, cask ale no longer being served or, worse still, pub closure.

The 2022 Bromley CAMRA Festival was the most successful to date and we want to expand on its success.

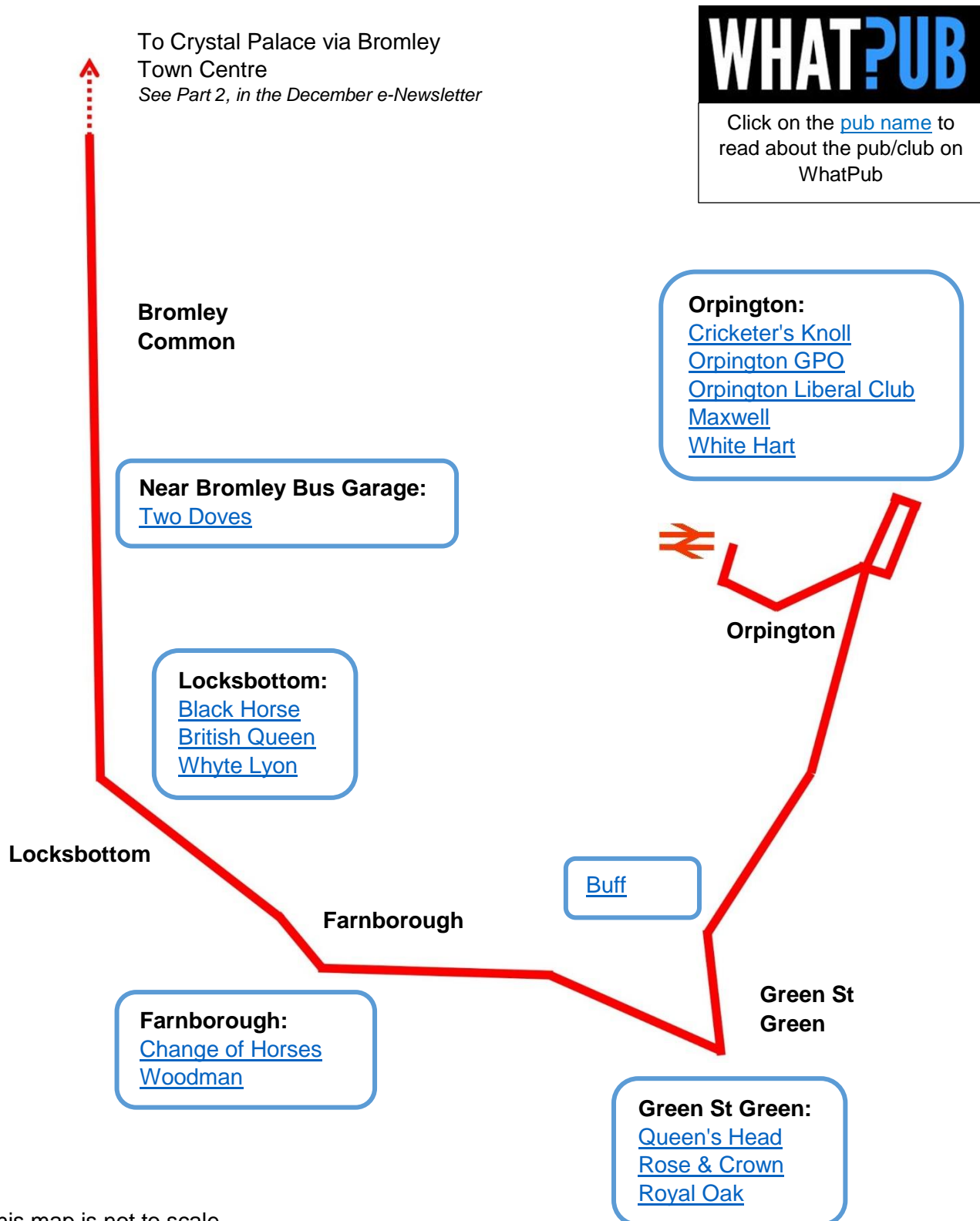

The 358 Bus / Pub Crawl, Part 3

This month, in the final part of our bus trip, we follow the route of the 358 from Bromley Common, through Locksbottom, Farnborough and Green Street Green to its terminus at Orpington Station.

Pubs are listed in alphabetical order

The third (and final) section of the 358 route takes us past, or very close to a total of **14** pubs, plus one club, all serving cask ales.

Resuming our journey on the edge of Bromley Town Centre, the bus continues heading south along the A21. Alight at the *Bromley Bus Garage* stop for the [Two Doves](#); this pub is on Oakley Rd, and can be reached by walking along Gravel Hill, opposite the bus garage

Another three stops takes us to Locksbottom and the PRU Hospital. There are three pubs in Locksbottom: the [Black Horse](#); [British Queen](#); and [Whyte Lyon](#).

Next comes Farnborough Village, with its two pubs, the [Change of Horses](#), and the [Woodman](#). There was a feature on Farnborough in the September issue of the [e-Newsletter](#).

Alight at the *Farnborough Hill / Bus Garage* stop for the three pubs in Green St Green. The 358 buses are operated from this garage, and therefore it is not unusual for a crew change to take place here. Walk along High St. to get to the pubs. The first pub is the [Queen's Head](#), an Ember Inn. The other two pubs are both adjacent to the roundabout on the A21, the [Royal Oak](#) and [Rose & Crown](#).

Back on the bus, the route now takes a sharp turn left after the bus garage and heads towards the centre of Orpington, passing the [Buff](#) at Crescent Way.

Once in Orpington town centre, the route does an 'out and back' along the high street to the Walnuts Centre, before it returns to the War Memorial roundabout to complete its route at Orpington Station. In this area, you have the choice of four pubs, plus the multiple award winning Orpington Liberal Club.

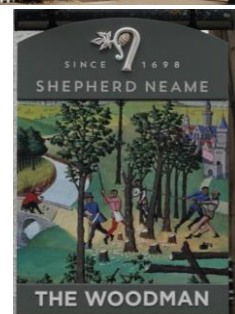

Some statistics:

Based on data available as at 1st November, there were a total of **98** pubs and eligible¹ clubs in Bromley, which normally served at least one real ale. Half of these venues are either directly on, or within approx. 10 minutes walk of the 358 bus route. A further six pubs are a few minutes of further walking.

- Directly on the route: 22 pubs/clubs
- Within approx. 10 mins walk: 27 pubs/clubs

History of the 358 route

The 358 is now a high frequency trunk route in southeast London, however, when it began it was very different.

The route was started by small independent bus company, Metrobus, in 1989, with just two return journeys a day, Monday to Friday only. Initially, it was operated as a commercial service and London Transport passes were not accepted; it being cash fares only. It was operated with double deck buses, running via Westmoreland Road Bromley and did not serve central Bromley.

In 1991 it became an hourly every day service, and was diverted via central Bromley, using single deck buses, due to the railway bridge at Shortlands. In 2002 it was taken over as a TFL route, with Metrobus running the service under contract.

At 15 miles long, it is one of London's longest routes. It has always been operated by Metrobus (now part of the Go Ahead Group) from their garage at Green Street Green.

Gone, But Not Forgotten

The Editor looks at three of the lost pubs along Bromley Common / Hastings Rd.

There used to be more pubs along this part of the 358 route, including some which actually appeared in the Good Beer Guide (GBG).

Two of these pubs have now been converted to new uses, whilst a third has been demolished and the site redeveloped. However, in a nod to their previous uses, all three have pub-styled signage on posts.

Following the route of the 358 towards Orpington, the first of these former pubs was the [Five Bells](#), where a tile retailer now occupies the site. Once a Charrington house, this pub appeared in the GBG in 1976 and 1977. The 1977 edition described it as a '*busy, popular and friendly local*'. Next, adjacent to Bromley Bus Garage, and now converted into a McDonalds was the [Sawyer's Arms](#). This pub appeared in no less than five editions of the GBG, listed as serving Shepherd Neame beers. The final appearance was in 1981, which noted '*The only draught mild in the area*'. The final former pub, now converted into a Majestic Wine, was the [Plough](#). Bromley CAMRA have no knowledge about this former pub, however a 1986 photo shows Whitbread signage. More photos can be viewed via [this link](#).

A Free^(*) Day Trip to Reading

The Editor has been to a couple of the Good Beer Guide pubs in Reading.

(*) Excluding the cost of the beer...

Do you have a London Freedom Pass? If so, did you know that you can now use it to go all the way to Reading?

Early last month, we discovered that the Freedom Pass now appeared to allow *'those of a certain age'* to travel all the way to Reading, and to the intermediate stations, but only if you travel on the Elizabeth Line service. This seemed too good to be true, so we decided to give it a try...

The 2023 Good Beer Guide lists **five** pubs in Reading, however we limited ourselves to just two of them. In fact, it was a struggle to drag ourselves away from the first pub, as it had twelve handpumps, ten of which were with Thornbridge beers, for a tap takeover.

On the day of our visit there were ten Thornbridge beers, plus one each from Tiny Rebel and Siren.

Also numerous ciders and craft kegs.

The [Nags Head](#), is a bit of a hike from the station, but is certainly worth making the effort to get there, and not just for the twelve handpumps. (Please see the WhatPub description for full details).

Our second pub was the [Greyfriar](#), very convenient for the station, with five ale handpumps in use on the day of our visit. It was interesting to note that two of their five pumps had dark beers (Five Points, Railway Porter & Wantsum, Black Prince).

WhatPub describes it as:
'Traditional yet modern pub with eight handpumps and 14 keg lines, offering a good choice of beers from local, independent breweries. Bottled and canned beers also come from country-wide and foreign brewers...'



The small print

- The London Freedom Pass will get you all the way to Reading, or to any of the intermediate stops, however the 60+ Oyster is NOT valid beyond the London boundary;
- Applies only to Elizabeth Line trains. NOT on services by other operators;
- Journey time between Reading and Paddington is approx. one hour (and there are no toilets on the trains!);
- The Freedom Pass does not work on the barriers at Reading, so you will need to show your pass to the member of staff on the gate.

Local Pub, Club & Brewery News

Our BR6 Area Pub and Club Contact looks back at some changes during 2022, and we have a photo from the branch's final social event in 2022.

BR6, Orpington

During 2022, we saw a net increase of real ale outlets in Orpington, albeit only by one. The new addition was that of [Chelsfield Lakes Golf Centre](#), which has now been reliably serving a cask ale for more than six months. In the last 3 or 4 months, *Tonbridge Traditional* has been available and in very good condition, whenever I've tried it.

This is not a private club, so with the venue open to the public seven days a week, this is a welcome addition to the area. There is good access on foot from both Knockholt or Chelsfield stations, via 20 to 30 minutes of walking along mostly rural footpaths. Alternatively, the R7 bus stop is about 10 minutes walk away along Court Road, which although busy, has a continuous footway. If you can find a designated driver, the Golf Centre has by far the largest pub car park anywhere in Bromley borough!

Sadly, during the year we said goodbye to the former Wetherspoons, the Harvest Moon. We understand that the closure was due to the lease not being renewed.

The loss of the Wetherspoons was balanced out by the reopening of the nearby [White Hart](#), after a closure of more than a year due to a fire.

Members will probably recall that long-standing licensees Ade & Kay left the [Five Bells](#) in Chelsfield in June, with the former chef, Sam, taking over. The public bar has now been redecorated, with the adjacent toilets refurbished. There is live music on Wednesdays and a quiz night every Tuesday, with Ade returning as quizmaster. Opening times have returned to the 'pre-Covid' hours of Mon to Sat 12 to 11 & Sun 12 to 10. When I was there during the Christmas period, there were three ales on: Wainwright Amber Ale; Whitstable Bay; and Doom Bar.

Hopefully you received and read our CAMRA Chairman's Christmas message issued on 19th December providing a synopsis of the year, and what CAMRA has been working on.

On a more detailed note, let me sum up what CAMRA was doing during December 2022.

Brewery closures and the £20 pint!

Well, I mentioned above the plight of our breweries, as every day seems to see another closed. With some it may be that their business model was wrong, but many others have closed due to unsustainable costs. Wherever this occurs, someone will be now missing their favourite pint.

CAMRA has made a plea to the Chancellor to confirm that breweries, pubs, and hospitality businesses will receive support, especially given that the current scheme runs out in April 2023. Read more about this [here](#). Fingers crossed for the New Year!

Thankfully, there has been a degree of support, as the Government has frozen the alcohol duty in the New Year, until August which. Our Chair, Nik Antona comments "CAMRA now looks forward to the new, lower rate of duty on draught beer and cider served in pubs and clubs coming into force in August 2023, to really help our locals compete with the likes of supermarket alcohol". However, those volunteers were unable to source a landlord/lady and it was not looking good. In steps a new team of volunteers, including the vicar, the Reverend Rebecca Elliott, who will each be filling the breach and carrying out shifts behind the bar. I wonder what her sermons will be like!

A CAMRA roadmap

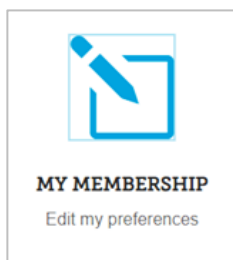
No, not one guiding you to the best beer in the world or best taproom etc. but CAMRA setting out its digital future!

5 Perfect. Probably the best you are ever likely to find. A seasoned drinker will award this score very rarely.
