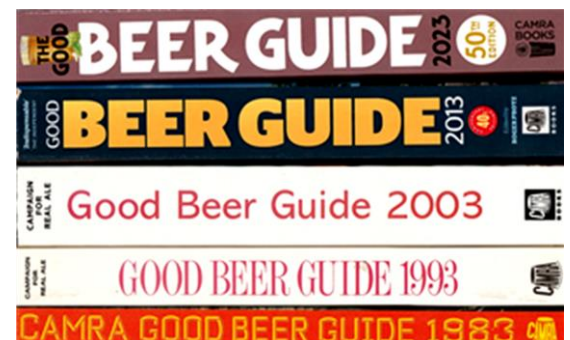

Members are asked to arrive by 2.45 pm, for a prompt 3.00 pm start. As well as reviewing the branch's activities over the past year and looking at the future, a major event at the AGM will be the election of a new Branch Committee for the 2023/24 year.

I mentioned in the January and February e-Newsletters that we were looking for volunteers to join the incoming committee. I also said how important it was to have new branch members join the committee from time to time as renewal and regeneration leads to a much stronger body. Bromley Branch is still seeking a candidate for the crucial role of Pub Protection Officer.

Please do not be put off by the grand title of the role. What we are looking for is for someone who is prepared to put their enjoyment of pubs and pub heritage to greater use, thus ensuring all our branch members continue to have the best possible choice of drinking establishments available to them.

In general, the role is about making sure Bromley Council maintain and enforce pub protection policies in their plans. It will need someone who is good at collecting and presenting information about what is happening, or going to happen, to pubs in our area. Our Committee is spread far and wide in our branch area and will be able to act as your information resources in this respect. So, the new postholder will have a team of people who can give advice and assistance on how to deal with the local authority, as well as on handling CAMRA procedures. We also have strong contacts with neighbouring CAMRA branches and CAMRA Regional Officers, so guidance on the day-to-day functions and activities in the role are readily available. The Fellowship Inn, Bellingham

This month, we have a branch visit to the Grade II Listed Fellowship Inn adjacent to Bellingham Station.

Description from WhatPub:

Grade II listed, mock Tudor style, built as a 'improved' public house in 1923-4 by F.G. Newnham, house architect of brewery Barclay Perkins and Co. It was built as part of the London County Council's Bellingham Estate. By the mid-20th century, it was renowned for attracting many famous live bands of that era. It had many rooms including a theatre and off sales, although by the early 21st century only one room was open. It was then only the saloon, with a wood panelled interior, that was being used.

In early 2016 major plans were announced to use lottery grant funding to transform the site to be 'something special for the community' – a cinema, a café, a music hub with rehearsal spaces and live music stage, plus the pub. Works progressed well with the pub closed, and it officially re-opened in June 2019 re-named the Fellowship & Star. Seating is at a mish-mash of high tables and chairs, bench seating and low tables and chairs around all sides of a central bar servery, with some booth seating towards the rear. Lots of the original dark wood panelling remains.

Having closed once again in March 2020, the pub reopened under new management on 21st September 2022, and reverted to its original name. 3 handpumps for cask ales.

Breaking News. The Mitre on Croydon Rd closed in approx. 2019 after being sold to developers. Various Planning applications for extensions and the conversion of the upper parts into flats were submitted to Bromley Council. An application approved in 2022 included the retention of the pub on the ground and first floors.

A recently submitted application is now seeking to convert the former into a non-public house use.

Bromley CAMRA will be submitting an objection to the proposals which we believe contrary to the Bromley Local Plan and the London Plan.

Pub closures

These continue to make the headlines, with 554 pubs being closed in the last six months of 2022. Round my way we have recently (temporarily?) lost the Old Jail which hopefully will re-open but many of our pubs are now really having to tighten their belts to avoid closure, **for ever**.



So, with this in mind, CAMRA is calling on the Prime Minister and Chancellor to put together a support package to save the UK's pubs.

Similarly, CAMRA is calling on all pub goers to join the campaign for urgent help to save our (your) pubs which includes giving more help with energy bills from April, making the business rates system fairer for pubs and cutting tax on draught beer and cider by 20% to give our

locals a fighting chance to compete with the likes of supermarket alcohol. More information is [here](#).

Alcohol advertising

Not here as yet, but did you know that pub goers and beer drinkers across Scotland are being asked to join the fight to stop a ban on advertising alcohol from ruining the choice of good beer and the future of small breweries across that country?

CAMRA has commented that the proposals in the Scottish Government's consultation on banning alcohol advertising could spell the end for consumer choice, independent breweries and local festivals – but also be devastating for all alcohol producers and drinks festivals in Scotland. Crumbs, I wish I could identify that from a beer but it does sound scrumptious!



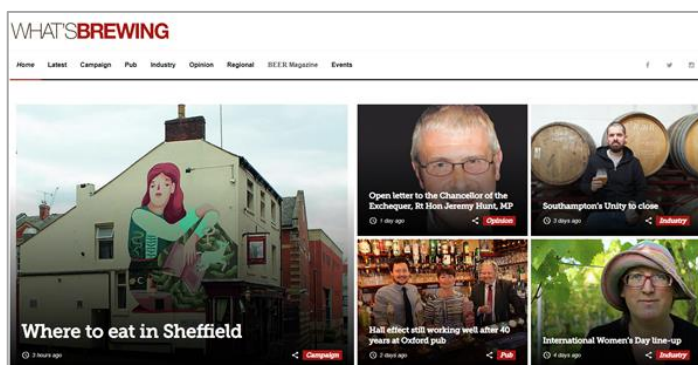
The runners up were Robinson's Old Tom (which thankfully you can get down here, albeit in bottles) and Dancing Duck's Dark Drake.

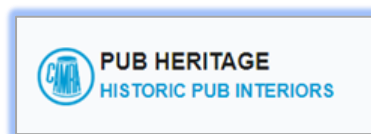

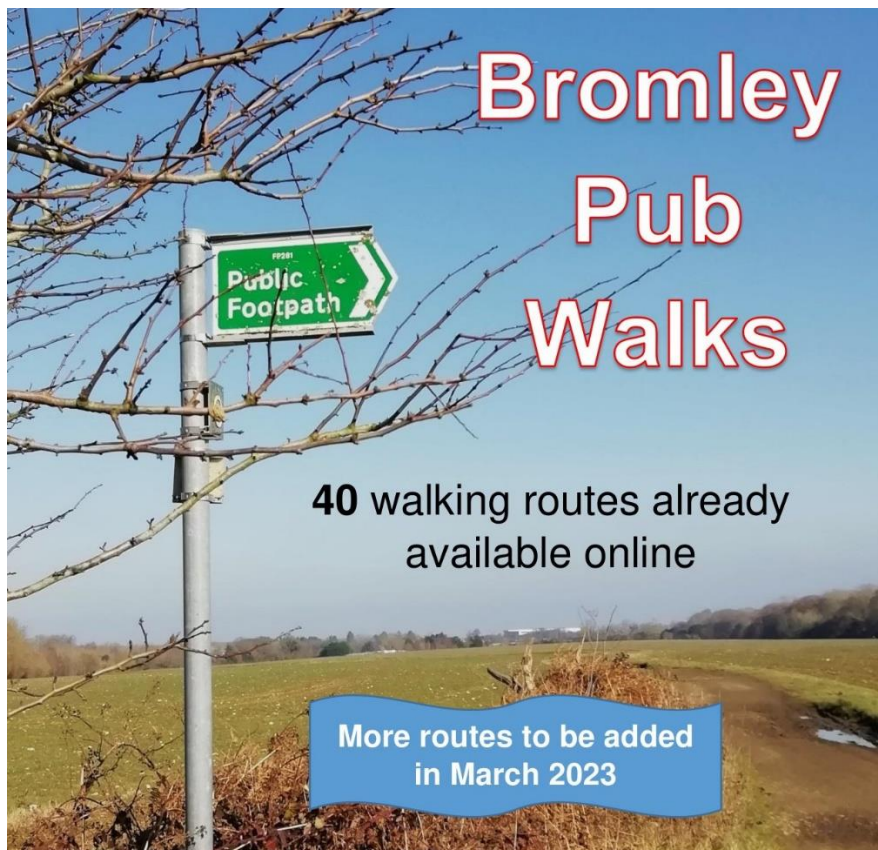
