# **Branch AGM on 18 March**

Important news from 2023 Bromley CAMRA AGM.



The 12th AGM of the branch was held on 18th March at Orpington Liberal Club, A total of 31 branch members attended, plus 3 members of other branches and Regional Director Geoff Strawbridge.

Several longstanding members of the Committee decided to stand down and leave the Committee at the AGM, including some who had held posts on the Committee since the branch was relaunched in 2011. The branch is very grateful for all their hard work on behalf of CAMRA over the years:

**Charles Tucker**, Branch Chair and Festival Coordinator since 2020.

Murray Mackay, Treasurer since 2017

**Tim Wilding**, Pub Database Coordinator, and 'Branch IT Manager' since 2011, plus various other roles during that period, most recently including Webmaster.

In addition, some other members have decided to reduce their CAMRA

commitments, whilst continuing as members of the Committee:

**Norman Warner**, Membership Secretary since 2019, however Norman continues as the BR6 Pub/Club Contact

**Bob Keaveney** stands down as e-Newsletter Editor after 3 years but continues as Beer Score Coordinator. (However, Bob has also taken on the temporary role of Acting Chair, see below)

The 2023/24 Committee sees several new faces joining the existing team. For the past few months these prospective new Committee members have been 'shadowing' their predecessors, to ensure a smooth handover of responsibilities.

As our outgoing Chair Charles wrote in the February e-Newsletter: "...the Branch Committee is not a staid, antiquated object – it is a living body that exists to serve both its branch members and CAMRA campaign aims. We always need renewal and regeneration with new committee members, as this leads to a much stronger body."

We are also very pleased to welcome the return of Bob Gordon as the Pub Protection Officer, having previously held that post until 2020. After a career in town planning, Bob brings considerable skill and experience to this crucial post, at a time when pubs are seen to be under even greater threat from redevelopment.

Tim Wilding, although standing down from the Committee, has kindly agreed to continue to manage the Bromley CAMRA email system, without which the Committee would probably grind to a halt.

Unfortunately, we were not able to fill the post of Chair at the AGM. As an interim measure, former Branch Chair Bob Keaveney has agreed to be 'Acting Chair' for the next few months.

# **Our new Acting Chair writes:**

I am looking forward to the forthcoming year with considerable enthusiasm. It is very heartening that the new Branch Committee now includes many 'new faces' who, together with the continuing members, are all willing to volunteer their time to help ensure the branch can continue into the future.

However, the current economic situation is putting pubs and breweries under greater pressure than ever before. As reported in recent issues of the e-Newsletter, after several years of growth, during which several new pubs opened or reopened, sadly we are now seeing pub closures in Bromley.

With the new strengthened Committee, Bromley CAMRA is now in a better position to campaign to try to protect our pubs from the threat of redevelopment, and to support and promote all the excellent pubs and clubs in our area.

But as a member of CAMRA you can also play your part, by visiting and drinking in our pubs and clubs, and by supporting CAMRA's campaigning, both nationally and locally.

#### The Coronation

The Government has announced an extension to pub opening hours in England and Wales to 1AM on 5, 6, 7 May to mark the coronation of King Charles. Whilst our Chair, Nik Antona, has commented on our being able to raise a glass to the decision to extend the pub and club opening hours, the comment was also made, and I quote,

"It is the perfect time to get down to your local to enjoy a pint of fresh hand-pulled cask ale or real cider with friends and family. With costs for businesses still rocketing, our pubs, clubs and breweries need as much support as they can get from the communities they serve so that they can continue to survive and thrive. That's why CAMRA is encouraging everyone who is able to support their local pubs, social clubs, breweries and cider producers by making the most of these extended hours for the King's coronation weekend."

# The Budget and consequent tax reforms

Better off? Not better off? Well at least we saw a 11p cut in draught duty when compared with Supermarkets. In response to the budget our Chair observed that "The Chancellor has made a welcome move to increase the draught duty rate discount to 11p, which will help pubs compete with the likes of supermarket alcohol. However, the lower tax rate is not coming until August, and we must hope that as many pubs as possible will be able to keep their doors open until then".

Sting in the TAIL – Why is there always one. You look at a little scorpion, only to find that it has injected its venom and you are now feeling ill? So it is here.

You know the take outs you enjoyed in Lock Down? And that some pubs continue this great trade, thereby encouraging you to buy from the pub, not the supermarket? Well, the Government also announced that decanting from draught duty paid containers (casks to you and me), for consumption off the premises, will be prohibited. WHAT? They kept that quiet. CAMRA comment "If implemented, will equate to a stealth ban on takeaway pints and is extremely disappointing for licensees and consumers, and especially designated drivers that like to take away a pint or two to enjoy responsibly at home. We will continue to campaign for a workable solution".

Here's hoping for better news this Summer.

# **Bromley Pub Walks**

After the very cold and wet start to March, the recent start of British Summer Time is a reminder that warmer weather should now (hopefully) be here soon. So, with longer days and better weather on the horizon, maybe it's time to start thinking about getting out to visit more of Bromley's pubs, whilst also taking some exercise?

There are more than 30 pubs and clubs in the 'rural' areas of Bromley, plus a few more just over the border in Croydon, Kent and Surrey. Bromley CAMRA has identified a network of paths and tracks which link them all together, and we have published a series of brief guides for these walking routes, which range in distance from less than a mile up to about 5 miles.

Each of the Bromley Pub Walk Guides briefly describes the route and terrain, lists the pubs/clubs that you can visit, and provides information about public transport.

Almost all of the pubs & clubs are accessible by public transport on at least 6 days of the week, so it's really easy for drinkers and walkers to get to and from these excellent establishments, to get out into the fresh air, take some exercise and enjoy a drink or two.

Six new routes have been added to the network for 2023. These new routes are:



- 56, Chelsfield (Five Bells or Bo Peep) to Crockenhill and Swanley
- 60, Biggin Hill (Aperfield) to Tatsfield
- 61, Leaves Green to Tatsfield
- 70, Hayes Stn to Shirley
- 71, Keston to Shirley
- 72, Shirley to Selsdon

Apart from Route 72, all the new routes start at a Bromley pub, but finish at pubs in either Kent, Surrey or Croydon. Route 72 is entirely within Croydon, finishing at the Golden Ark micropub or the nearby Wetherspoons (or both!).
