





Beer Festival News

Preparations continue for the 2023 Bromley Beer & Cider Festival.

The month of the festival has finally arrived and we'll be making loads of finalising tweaks throughout this month and June was no slouch either, being action packed from start to finish.

<u>TCKTY</u> is the place to pre-order your tickets and tokens.

I went through a first aid course to ensure all festivalgoers have medical aid if needed (I'm hoping no one does). I highly recommend anyone to complete a course if they can, the statistics of having aid early on during a medical emergency was a revelation to me and the fact that most trained people are more likely to encounter a situation with family or friends brought home how important it is.

With most of the beers being confirmed, Matt from the Three Hounds has been compiling the list for us; hopefully we get the balance right for our sunny festival. This week the chilli chocolate stout from Marlix was one highlight confirmed. We've been informed that the heat to chocolate stout ratio is on point for all you spice heads.

Also, the festival glass is going into production.



On my short holiday down to Weston Super Mare I became courier for 90 litres of some of the best and "award winning" Somerset ciders and Perry. I managed to reach <u>Heck's Farmhouse Cider</u> with ease even though Glastonbury Music Festival was in full swing; guess they were too busy partying in the field to pick up any cider. The perry and port wine of Glastonbury cider was still available, amazingly.

Also met Ben Crossman a more local farmer to the Weston area. He is a very passionate farmhouse cider producer and I managed to pick up an array of his wares, which we don't have this way very often. While there I learned a bit of the history of his cider making equipment. I've added the links above to the two cider companies for cider aficionados who what to know more.

The Branch Secretary runs through some of the national news from CAMRA.


Happy Summer everyone. Hope you are all enjoying the weather and supporting your local by sitting in their grounds enjoying, as I did recently, some cheesy chips and, wonder of wonders, a "Dark Side of the Moose" (quick plug for The Queens Head in Downe!)

But back to business - my review of CAMRA news over the last few weeks includes:

CIDER – a summer drink if ever there was!

I have previously touched upon a major bone of contention that much of the cider readily available to drink is little more than apple flavoured squash with alcohol added, being as far away from a true "Apple" cider as is possible.

Well, in backing me up, CAMRA has recently added to its ever-growing "Learn & Discover" platform a complete education relating to Cider. The Basics - CAMRA - Campaign for Real Ale



Deposit Return Scheme

Do you remember as a kid, collecting glass soft drinks bottles (R Whites anyone?) and taking them back to the off licence for your 6d back on the bottle? Or even going to the same shop in later years and "buying" bottles for your home brew experiments?

Well HM Gov have you in mind with the "Deposit Return Scheme" whereby we will be required to pay a small deposit when purchasing drinks which can be redeemed when returning the containers to a designated collection point.

Weirdly, glass bottles are only included in Wales, not England! We just get the charge on tins and plastic bottles! I can see a great trade on the Welsh borders!

Due to be implemented in October 2025, CAMRA has recently commented on the expansion of the scheme to Scotland, but further modified. As CAMRA has put it, "CAMRA supports the principles of a deposit return scheme, but the Scottish Government's proposals risked a catastrophic reduction in choice for consumers of quality beer and cider from small and independent businesses from across these islands". So, there you have it, England is different from Wales and Scotland different further still!

High Street Rental Auctions

A quite important issue this relating to pub protection. Briefly, CAMRA's position is that High Street Rental Auctions are a welcome proposal, particularly the focus on community uses, but that pubs must retain their planning protections. It can and will affect how vacant pubs are to be marketed. I do not have the space here to go further into the issue but as a CAMRA member you should have received commentary on the UK Gov consultation. The period has now been extended to 7 July so you do still have time to act on this. Yes, it does take more than 5 minutes but CAMRA have a template and guidance see: IEMPLATE-consultation-response-HSRA.docx (live.com)

Ringwood Brewery

Last month I sadly related the story of the Blacksheep brewery appointing Administrators. Now we hear that the Ringwood brewery is being put up for sale by its lord and master, Carlsberg Marston. As our National Chair, Nik Antona has said, "Ringwood has been hugely successful over the years, moving from its original site in 1986 after outgrowing it. CAMRA will be keeping a watchful eye on the sale and will be urging whoever takes over to ensure these traditions remain at the heart of its operations. It would be a sad day for beer enthusiasts if this was not the case".

Thankfully it does appear that the sale is not due to a failing business and given that Ringwood's Old Thumper was a former Supreme Champion Beer of Britain in 1988, let's hope that new genuine owners can be found soon! A Trip to the "These Hills" Beer Festival

Deep in Harvey's country, there lies a craft beer festival called These Hills. A group of Bromley CAMRA members made the trip. After mingling with the Glyndebourne-bound upper crust on the train, we arrived in Lewes. Bypassing the excellent Gardener's Arms, a beeline was made for the Snowdrop Inn on the outskirts of town. Built almost into the white cliffs of the town, it offered a stunning array of local cask and craft.

After a little pre-loading at the Snowdrop, where even the scorching sun couldn't keep the resident Samoyed pups inside, cabs were booked to get to the festival. Aptly named The Party Field, the site is a jaw-droppingly beautiful space nestling within the south Downs. These Hills indeed. Someone described it as 'the most beautiful beer garden in Britain'.

A huge range of brewers from these islands and beyond were on draft, but none could really compete with the natural beauty of the surroundings. The Harvey's tent from last year was conspicuously absent, but with cider from the Delaware Forest, wild ale from Australia and mead from Norway, there was something for everyone. The festival's organisers, Beak Brewing, have wisely capped the number of tickets, ensuring queuing was a rarity. The only limitations were few options for those seeking darker styles (just one imperial stout was discovered), and the poorly lit country lane taking you back to Lewes town.

With the hot summer weather of recent weeks comes an undeniable urge to drink (and dine) al-fresco - and what better place than a multi award-winning pub garden in TN14 7QB?



We are talking

here of The Blacksmiths Arms in Cudham which, despite the best attempts by UK Power Networks closing



roads around it, has once again triumphed over adversary with a wonderful display of flowers in the substantial well-groomed gardens. To date the pub has 4 awards from Coolings, 4 from Bromley in Bloom, five from The London Garden Society and 1 from Harris Hospice. It has also been the only pub included in the "yellow book" of gardens. A pretty good achievement.

Anthony Chipps and his family took over the mantle a few years back from the previous landlady, Joyce, and continues her good work. So much so that Joyce can often be seen sitting in her favourite seat in the outdoor area – just don't take her chair!



The pub has a good selection of drinks including up to 4 cask ales which at the time of my visit included beer from Harvey's, Adnams and Sharps. Plus, a food menu with daily specials and live acoustic music every 1st Sunday from 4PM.

Given the problems of recent months with the roadworks, as they near completion, now is the time to get up there – just don't try to play footy in the gardens!
